Elder McAllister arrived here June 11, 1887, and has had charge of the business department in this Office. He succeeded Elder Robert L. Campbell in that responsibility, and has been exceedingly active in the discharge of his duties, taking a great deal of interest in the business, and laboring very faithfully to make it a success. He has performed a mission covering a period of nearly two years and five months, with credit to himself and perfect satisfaction to ourselves. We pray God that Elder McAllister may have a safe and speedy journey, and joyfully meet his beloved family and friends at home, and live long to continue his labors and usefulness in the Church of Jesus Christ until he shall be satisfied.

Tuesday, December 31. Elder Samuel R. Brough, president of the Irish Mission, wrote as follows:

(Mill. Star 52: 27)

"At our meeting on the 26th I was considerably molested by the mobocrats but no damage was done to persons or property. * * Yesterday a friend informed us that meetings had been held in several public halls in Portadown and that speeches had been delivered against us, the people being warned against attending our services. We are thus well advertized and people generally seem very concerned over us. Some are desirous of hearing our testimony, and some want us driven from the town. More has been done by the enemy towards warning the people in a short time than we could do in a year, and we may therefore see how easy it is for God to make the wrath of man further His purposes."
